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A BILL FOR AN ACT

To require certain National public officials to disclose and divest their financial interests; to create an ethics commission to administer this act; and for other purposes.

	BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS OF THE FEDERATED STATES OF MICRONESTA:
1.	Section 1. Definitions.
2	(1) "Public official" means, for purposes of this act, an official
3	of the National Government who holds any of the following positions:
4	(a) President of the Federated States of Micronesia;
5	(b) Vice President of the Federated States of Micronesia;
6,	(c) Member of the Congress of the Federated States of Micronesia;
7	(d) Secretary of a department;
8	(e) Attorney General;
9	(f) Chief Justice and Justice of the Supreme Court;
10	(g) Division chiefs;
11	(h) Heads of executive offices; and
12	(i) Legislative counsel of the Congress of the Federated States of
13	Micronesia;
: 4	(2) "Financial interest" means an interest held by an individual, his
15	spouse, or minor children which is:
16	(a) An ownership interest in a business;
1.7	(b) A creditor interest in an insolvent business;
18	(c) A loan or other debt or interest; and
19	(d) Λ directorship or officership in a business;
20	(3) "Business" means any corporation, partnership, sole proprietorship,
21	firm, enterprise, franchise, association, organization, self-employed individual,
22	holding company, joint stock company, receivership, trust, or any legal entity
23	through which business is conducted for profit;
24	(4) "Commission" means the National Government Ethics Commission.
25	Section 2. Financial disclosure.

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- 1 (1) Every public official shall within 30 days of the effective date
- 2 of this act, or within 30 days after commencement of his public office, file
- 3 with the Commission a statement of his financial interests for the preceding
- 4 calendar year.
- 5 (2) Every public official shall file a statement of financial
- 6 interests for the preceding calendar year with the Commission on or before
- 7 December 1 of each year that the public official holds such a position.
- 8 (3) A candidate for elective public office shall file a statement
- 9 of financial interests for the preceding calendar year with the Commission with-
- 10 in 10 days of filing his legal declaration of candidacy for election as a public
- ll official; PROVIDED, that this subsection shall not apply to a person who has
- 12 filed a statement pursuant to subsection (2). A declaration of candidacy to
- 13 appear on the ballot shall not be considered legal unless a statement of financial
- 14 interests is timely filed in proper form. If proper form is not followed, the
- 15 name of the candidate shall not appear on the ballot.
- 16 (4) If the candidate files his legal declaration of candidacy or
- 17 petition to appear on the ballot for election prior to January 1 of the year in
- 18 which the election is held, the condidate shall also file a statement for the
- 19 year preceding the year in which the election is held.
- 20 (5) Each candidate for public office nominated by a public official
- 21 or governmental body and subject to confirmation by a public official or governmental
- 22 body shall file a statement of financial interests for the preceding calendar year
- 23 with the Commission and with the official or body that is vested with the power of
- 24 confirmation at least 10 days before the official or body shall approve or reject
- 25 the nomination.

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- 1 (6) No public employee shall be allowed to take the oath of office
- 2 or enter or continue upon his duties unless he has filed a statement of financial
- 3 interests with the Commission as required by this act. Any public official or
- 4 candidate for public office who fails to file or falsely files a statement is
- 5 guilty of a National offense and may be fined not more than \$1,000 or be
- 6 imprisoned for not more than one year, or both.
- 7 (7) The statement of financial interests shall be filed on a form
- 8 prescribed by the Commission and shall be signed under penalty of perjury by
- 9 the person required to file the statement.
- 10 (8) The statement shall include the following information for the
- Il preceding calendar year with regard to the person required to file the statement
- 12 and the members of his immediate family:
- 13 (a) The names of all businesses with which he is associated;
- 14 (b) The category or type and amount of all sources of income in
- 15 excess of \$1,000. It shall be sufficient to report whether the amount is: less
- 16 than \$2,500; \$2,500-\$5,000; \$5,000-\$10,000; \$10,000-\$25,000; or more than \$25,000;
- 17 (c) The name and the amount of stock in excess of \$1,000 at fair
- 18 market value held in a business by the person; and
- 19 (d) The name, address, and type of security given of each creditor
- 20 to whom the value of \$5,000 or more was owed and still outstanding; PROVIDED, that
- 21 debts arising out of retail installment transactions need not be included.
- 22 Section 3. Financial divestiture.
- 23 (1) Every public official who has a financial interest within the
- 24 meaning of this act shall, within 60 days after the commencement of his public
- 25 office, or within 60 days of the effective date of this act, divest himself of that

- 1 interest for the duration of his public office. Financial interests shall be
- 2 placed in "blind trust" or in any other system which will ensure that those
- 3 interests cannot be managed by the public official while in office. Any business
- 4 interest which involves the ownership and management of a business must be divested
- 5 in a manner that will ensure the separation of ownership and management from the
- 6 public official during his tenure in office. Divestiture shall be made subject to
- 7 the approval of the Commission. The Commission shall regulate procedures for the
- 8 proper divestiture of financial interests.
- 9 (2) Divestiture shall be a condition of continuing in public office.
- . 10 With respect to Congress Members or public officials removable only by impeachment
- ll who are serving at the time this act becomes law, the failure to divest shall be
- 12 deemed an offense justifying removal from office.
- 13 Section 4. National Government Ethics Commission.
- 14 (1) There is created a National Government Ethics Commission consisting
- 15 of five members and including public officials, public employees, and other citizens.
- 16 Appointments to the Commission shall be made by the President of the Federated
- 17 States of Micronesia with the advice and consent of Congress of the Federated
- 18 States of Micronesia. Any vacancy occurring on the Commission shall be filled within
- 19 30 days in the manner in which that position was originally filled.
- 20 (2) Members of the Commission shall serve for two year staggered terms.
- 21 (3) The Commission shall elect a chairman and vice chairman; in the
- 22 absence of the chairman or in the event of a vacancy in that position, the vice
- 23 chairman shall serve as chairman.
- 24 (4) The Commission shall have the authority to appoint an executive
- 25 director and such additional personnel as it requires to perform its duties. The

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- l executive director shall serve at the pleasure of the Commission.
- 2 (5) Any action by the Commission shall require the affirmative vote
- 3 of three of its members and four members shall constitute a quorum.
- 4 (6) The chairman or any four members of the Commission may call a meet-
- 5 ing provided that adequate advance notice of the meeting is given.
- 6 (7) Members of the Commission shall be compensated at a rate of \$30 per
- 7 Commission meeting attended and shall receive reimbursement for their actual and
- 8 necessary expenses.
- 9 Section 5. <u>Duties of the Commission</u>. The Commission shall:
- 10 (1) Prescribe and publish after notice and opportunity for public comment,
- Il rules and regulations to carry out the provisions of this act.
- 12 (2) Prescribe forms for statements required by this act, and furnish such
- 13 forms to persons required to file such statements.
- 14 (3) Prepare and publish a manual or guidelines setting forth recommended
- 15 uniform methods of reporting and divesting for use by persons required to file and
- 16 divest under this act.
- 17 (4) Accept and file any information voluntarily supplied that exceeds the
- 18 requirements of this act.
- 19 (5) Preserve the statements filed with it for six years from the date of
- 20 receipt.
- 21 (6) Make statements and reports filed with the Commission available for
- 22 public inspection and copying at a reasonable cost during regular office hours.
- (7) Compile and maintain a current list and summary of all statements filed
- 24 (8) Prepare and publish reports as it may deem appropriate.
- 25 (9) Audit statements and reports filed with the Commission.

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- 1 (10) On its own initiative or upon request, issue and publish advisory
- 2 opinions on the requirements of this act for those who wish to use the opinion to
- 3 guide their own conduct.
- 4 (11) Prepare an annual report to the Congress and the President of the
- 5 Federated States of Micronesia, and the public, summarizing the activities of the
- 6. Commission and recommending any changes in the act. .
- 7 Section 6. Investigations by the Commission.
- 8 (1) Upon a complaint signed under penalty of perjury by any person or
 - upon its own motion, the Commission shall investigate any alleged violation of this
- 10 act. All Commission proceedings and records relating to an investigation shall be
- 11 confidential until a final determination is made by the Commission. The executive
- 12 director shall notify any person under investigation by the Commission of the
- 13 investigation and of the nature of the alleged violation and shall continue to
- 14 provide information to the complainant and the person under investigation concerning
- 15 action taken by the Commission together with the reasons for such action or nonaction,
- 16 (2) If, after investigation, the Commission finds that probable cause
- 17 exists for believing the allegation of the complaint, after adequate notice to the
- 18 accused, the Commission shall conduct a hearing on the matter. Such hearings shall
- 19 be in closed session unless the accused petitions for a public hearing.
- 20 (3) The Commission shall have the same power to compel the attendance of
- 21 witnesses and to issue subpoenas as is granted legislative committees.
- 22 (4) Any person whose activities are under investigation shall be entitled
- 23 to be represented by counsel of his own choosing and shall have an opportunity to
- 24 examine all records to be used at the hearing.
- 25 (5) The Commission shall keep a record of its investigations, inquiries,

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 Γ and proceedings; all records and transcripts of any investigations or inquiries

- 2 under this section shall be confidential until a final determination is made by
- 3 the Commission.
- 4 (6) The Commission shall report any finding of misconduct along with
- 5 such information and documents as it deems appropriate to the appropriate law
- 6 enforcement authorities.
- 7 Section 7. Authorization for appropriation. The sum of \$5,000 is authorized
- 8 to be appropriated from the General Fund of the Federated States of Micronesia for $\mathfrak t^{\pm}$
- 9 purpose of defraying operational and confingent expenses of the Federated States
- 10 of Micronesia Ethics Commission.
- 11 Section 8. Effective date. This act shall become law upon approval by the
- 12 President of the Federated States of Micronesia or upon its becoming law without
- 13 such approval.
