A BILL FOR AN ACT

To further amend title 55 of the Code of the Federated States of Micronesia, as amended, by amending section 223A, as established by Public Law No. 6-52, to permit advance payments of representation expenses and official expense allowances during the last 30 days of the fiscal year in certain circumstances; by adding a new section 223D to provide the conditions under which funds shall be advanced to travelers who are Members of the Congress; and for other purposes.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS OF THE FEDERATED STATES OF MICRONESIA:

1	Secti	on 1. Section 223A of title 55 of the Code of the
2	Federated	States of Micronesia, as established by Public Law No.
3	6-52, is h	nereby amended to read as follows:
4		"Section 223A. Representation expenses and official
5		expense allowances - Advances. Representation expenses and
6		official expense allowance expenses shall be accounted for
7		by affidavit, written contract or written receipt. The
8		Secretary of Finance, upon specific written request
9		containing specific justification satisfactory to the
10		Secretary of Finance, may make advance payments of
11		representation expenses and advance payments of official
12		expense allowances if the recipient of such advance payment
13		agrees to submit affidavits, contracts or receipts for
14		actual expenditures and return to the Secretary of Finance
15		all amounts advanced but not accounted for by affidavit,
16		contract or receipt no later than 30 days prior to the end
17		of the fiscal year; provided, however, that affidavits,
18		contracts or receipts for advances made within the last 30
19		days of the fiscal year shall be submitted to the Secretary
20		of Finance no later than the last day of the fiscal year."
21	Sect	ion 2. Title 55 of the Code of the Federated States of
22	Micronesia is hereby further amended by adding a new section 223D to	
23	read as follows:	
24		"Section 223D. Travel advances for Members of Congress.

One hundred percent (100%) of the estimated travel costs

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1	reflected in a valid Travel Authorization issued to a
2	Member of Congress for travel shall be advanced to the
3	traveler. Such advance shall not be withheld or denied for
4	failure of the traveler to repay amounts overdrawn through
5	advances for prior travel, or failure to file a travel
6	voucher and supporting documents in connection with prior
7	travel."
8	Section 3. This act shall become law upon approval by the
9	President of the Federated States of Micronesia or upon its becoming
10	law without such approval.

A BILL FOR AN ACT

To smend section 2 of Public Law No. 6-88 to reappropriate certain vetoed funds for public projects in the Mid-Mortlocks, and for other purposes.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS OF THE FEDERATED STATES OF MICRONESIA: Section 1. Section 2 of Public Law No. 6-88 is hereby amended 1 to read as follows: "Section 2. The sum of \$126,000, or so much thereof as may 3 be necessary, is hereby appropriated from the General Fund 4 of the Federated States of Micronesia for the fiscal year 5 ending September 30, 1990, for the purpose of funding 6 public projects in the Mid-Mortlocks area of the Mortlocks 7 Islands of Chuuk State. The sum appropriated by this Я section shall be apportioned as follows: 9 (1) Namoluk social and economic projects ... \$ 20,000 10 (2) Ettal 11 (a) Social and economic projects 17,089 12 (b) Supplement for vehicle 1,500 13 (c) Catholic mission, for non-religious 14 500 educational purposes 15 (d) Protestant mission, for non-religious 16 educational purposes 500 17 (3) Mooch social and economic projects 40,000 18 (4) Kuttu social and economic projects 40,000 19 (5) Mid-Mortlocks Authority operations 6,411" 20 Section 2. This act shall become law upon approval by the 21 President of the Federated States of Micronesia or upon its becoming 22 23 law without such approval.
