A BILL FOR AN ACT

To further amend title 11 of the Code of the Federated States of Micronesia by amending chapter 9, and for other purposes.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS OF THE FEDERATED STATES OF MICRONESIA:

1	Section 1. Section 903 of title 11 of the Code of the Federated States
2	of Micronesia, as amended, is hereby further amended to read as follows:
3	"Section 903. <u>Definitions.</u> Under this chapter, unless the context

5	(1) 'Account' shall have the meaning given to it by section 1803

15	(d) supplies a facility or arrangement for a safety

17	(2) 'Appeal' includes proceedings by way of discharging or
18	setting aside a judgment, and an application for a new trial or for
19	a stay of execution.
20	(3) 'Authorized officer' means a person or class of persons
21	designated by the Secretary pursuant to applicable law as an

1	authorized officer or officers for the purposes of enforcing or
2	implementing the provisions of this chapter and related laws.
3	[(4) 'Cash dealer' means:
4	(a) a person who carries on a business of an insurer,
5	an insurance intermediary, a securities dealer or a futures broker;
6	(b) a person who carries on a business of dealing in
7	bullion, of issuing, selling or redeeming travelers' checks, money
8	orders or similar instruments, or of collecting holding and
9	delivering cash as part of a business of providing payroll
10	services;
11	(c) an operator of a gambling house, bingo parlor,
12	casino or lottery;
13	(d) a trustee, or manager of a unit trust.]
14	(<u>4</u> [5]) 'Covered property' means:
15	(a) any property held by a defendant;
16	(b) any property in which defendant has an interest; or
17	(c) any property held by a person to whom a defendant has
18	directly or indirectly made a gift caught by this
19	<u>chapter</u> [act].
20	(5[6]) 'Currency' shall have the meaning given to it by
21	section 1803 of title 12 of the Code of the Federated States of
22	Micronesia. [means the coin and paper money of the Federated States
23	of Micronesia or of a foreign country that is designated as legal
24	tender and which is customarily used and accepted as a medium of

22	(n) safe custody services.]
23	(<u>9</u> [10]) 'Gift' includes any transfer of property by a
24	person to another person directly or indirectly:
25	(a) after the commission of a serious crime by the first
26	person;

1	(b) for a consideration the value of which is
2	significantly less than the value of the property transferred; and
3	(c) to the extent of the difference between the market
4	value of the property transferred and the consideration provided by
5	the transferee.
6	(<u>10</u> [11]) 'Interest', in relation to property, means:
7	(a) a legal or equitable estate or interest in the
8	property; or
9	(b) a right, power or privilege in connection with the
10	property.
11	(<u>11</u> [12]) 'Money laundering' <u>shall have the meaning given</u>
12	to it by section 912 of this chapter. [means:
13	(a) engaging, directly or indirectly, in a transaction
14	that involves property that is proceeds of crime;
15	(b) receiving, possessing, concealing, disguising,
16	transferring, converting, disposing of, removing from or bringing
17	into the country any property which is a proceeds of crime;
18	(c) knowing, or having reasonable grounds for suspecting
19	that the property is derived or realized, directly or indirectly,
20	from some form of unlawful activity;
21	(d) where the conduct is conduct of a natural person,
22	without reasonable excuse, failing to take reasonable steps to
23	ascertain whether or not the]-[property is derived or realized
24	directly or indirectly, from some form of unlawful activity; or
25	(d) where the conduct is a conduct of a financial
26	institution, failing to implement or apply procedures and control

1	to prevent or combat money]-[laundering.]
2	(<u>12</u> [13]) 'Person' means any natural or legal person.
3	(13 [14]) 'Proceeding' or 'proceedings' means any procedure
4	conducted by or under the supervision of a judge or judicial
5	officer, however described, in relation to any alleged or proven
6	offense, or property derived from such offense, and includes an
7	inquiry, investigation, or preliminary or final determination of
8	facts.
9	$(\underline{14} \ [\underline{15}])$ 'Proceeds of crime' means fruits of a crime, or
10	any property that is:
11	(a) wholly or partly derived or realized directly or
12	indirectly from the commission of a serious offense;
13	(b) wholly or partly derived or realized from a disposal
14	or other dealing with proceeds of the offense; or
15	(c) wholly or partly acquired using proceeds of the
16	<u>offense;</u>
17	and includes, on a proportional basis, property into which any
18	property derived or realized directly from the offense was later
19	successively converted, transformed or intermingled, as well as
20	income, capital or other economic gains wholly or partially derived
21	or realized from such property at any time since the offense.
22	(<u>15</u> [16]) 'Property' <u>shall have the meaning given to</u>
23	it by section 1803 of title 12 of the Code of the Federated States
24	of Micronesia. [means currency and all other real or personal
25	property of every description, whether situated in the Federated
26	States of Micronesia or elsewhere and whether tangible or

1	intangible, and includes an interest in any such property.]
2	$(\underline{16} \ [\underline{17}])$ 'Property of or in the possession or control of
3	any person' includes any gift made by that person.
4	$(\underline{17} \ [\underline{18}])$ 'Realizable', with respect to 'covered property'
5	as defined by subsection (4 [6]), means:
6	(a) capable of being acquired, obtained, taken,
7	seized, confiscated, or procured, and is either cash or is capable
8	of being liquidated and converted into cash; or (b) capable of
9	being detected, located, found, discovered, and converted into cash
10	through payment of the amount or value of the defendant's interest
11	therein.
12	(<u>18</u> [19]) `Secretary' means and is synonymous with the
13	Secretary of the Department of Justice of the Federated States of
14	Micronesia, or with the chief law enforcement officer of the
15	Federated States of Micronesia, whatever the title of such position
16	is or in the future becomes.
17	(<u>19</u> [20]) 'Serious offense' means a violation of:
18	(a) any law of Federated States of Micronesia or any of
19	its States or political subdivisions, which is a criminal offense
20	punishable by imprisonment for a term of more than one year <u>or a</u>
21	<u>fine of more than \$10,000;</u> or
22	(b) a law of a foreign State, in relation to acts or
23	omissions, which, had they occurred in Federated States of
24	Micronesia or any of its States or political subdivisions, would
25	have constituted a criminal offense punishable by imprisonment for
26	a term of more than one year <u>or a fine of more than \$10,000</u> .

1	(<u>20</u> [21]) 'Supreme Court' means the Supreme Court of
2	the Federated States of Micronesia, and all its divisions, wherever
3	or whenever constituted.
4	(<u>21</u> [22]) 'Tainted property' means:
5	(a) property used in or in connection with, or intended to
6	be used in or in connection with the commission
7	of a serious offense; or
8	(b) proceeds of crime, as defined in subsection (14 [16])
9	of this section.
10	(<u>22</u> [23]) 'Unit trust' means any arrangement made for
11	the purpose or having the effect of providing for a person to have
12	funds available for investment; facilities for the participation by
13	a person as a beneficiary under a trust, or in any profits or
14	income arising from the acquisition, holding, management or
15	disposal of any property pursuant to the trust.
16	(23 [24]) A reference in this chapter to the law of:
17	(a) the Federated States of Micronesia;
18	(b) any State of the Federated States of Micronesia; or
19	(c) any foreign State,
20	includes a reference to a written or unwritten law of, or in force
21	in, any part of the Federated States of Micronesia (including its
22	States and political subdivisions), any part
23	of that State of the Federated States of Micronesia, or any part of
24	that foreign State, as the case may be."
25	Section 2. Section 908 of title 11 of the Code of the Federated States
26	of Micronesia, as amended, is hereby further amended by adding to read as

1 follows:

2	"Section 908. Dealing with property. For the purposes of this
3	<u>chapter</u> [act], dealing with property held by any person includes,
4	without prejudice to the generality of the expression:
5	(1) where the property is a debt owed to that person, making a
6	payment to any person in reduction or full settlement of the amount
7	of the debt;
8	(2) <u>giving</u> , taking [making] or receiving <u>property as</u> a gift [of
9	the property]; or
10	(3) removing the property from Federated States of Micronesia."
11	Section 3. Section 911 of title 11 of the Code of the Federated States
12	of Micronesia, as amended, is hereby further amended to read as follows:
13	"Section 912. <u>Benefiting from the proceeds of a serious offense.</u>
14	For the purposes of this <u>chapter</u> [act]:
15	(1) a person has benefited from an offense if that person has at
16	any time (whether before or after the commencement of this <u>chapter</u>
17	[act]) received any payment or other reward in connection with, or
18	derived any pecuniary advantage from, the commission of a serious
19	offense, whether committed by that person or someone else.
20	[(2) a person's proceeds of a serious offense (whether received
21	or derived before or after the commencement of this Act) are:
22	(a) any payments or other rewards received by the person
23	at any time in connection with the offense; and/or
24	[(b) any pecuniary advantage derived by the person at any
25	time from the commission of offense.]
26	(2 [3]) The value of a person's proceeds of a serious

1	offense is the aggregate of the values of all payments, rewards or
2	pecuniary advantages received by that person in connection with, or
3	derived by the person from, the commission of the offense."
4	Section 4. Section 912 of title 11 of the Code of the
5	Federated States of Micronesia, as amended, is hereby deleted in
6	its entirety and a new section 912 is enacted to read as follows:
7	"Section 912. Money laundering offenses.
8	(1) A person commits the offense of money laundering if the
9	person:
10	(a) acquires, possesses or uses property, knowing or
11	having reason to believe that it is derived directly or indirectly
12	from acts or omissions that would constitute a serious offense;
13	(b) conceals, disguises, converts, transfers, removes from
14	or brings into the Federated States of Micronesia property knowing
15	or having reason to believe that it is derived directly or
16	indirectly from acts or omissions that would constitute a serious
17	offense;
18	(c) engages directly or indirectly in a transaction that
19	involves property knowing or having reason to believe that it is
20	derived directly or indirectly from acts or omissions that would
21	<u>constitute a serious offense; or</u>
22	(d) enters into or becomes concerned in an arrangement
23	knowing or having reason to believe that it facilitates (by
24	whatever means) the acquisition, retention, use or control of
25	property derived directly or indirectly from acts or omissions that
26	would constitution a serious offense.

1	(2) Concealing or disguising property includes concealing or
2	disguising its nature, source, location, disposition, movement,
3	ownership or any rights with respect to it.
4	(3) An offense under subsection (1) of this section is committed
5	<u>by a person who:</u>
6	(a) commits or attempts to commit the offense;
7	(b) organizes, solicits or directs another person to
8	commit the offense;
9	(c) conspires with another person to commit the offense;
10	(d) participates as an accomplice to a person committing,
11	or attempting to commit, the offense; or
12	(e) aids or abets another person to commit the offense.
13	(4) The offense of money laundering, established under
14	subsection (1) or (3) of this section, is a felony offense,
15	punishable by imprisonment for a maximum term of ten years or a
16	maximum fine of \$100,000, or both; provided, however, in the case
17	of a corporation, company, commercial enterprise, commercial entity
18	or other legal person, the maximum fine shall be increased to
19	<u>\$500,000.</u>
20	(5) Any person may be convicted of a money laundering offense
21	under subsection (1) or (3) of this section notwithstanding the
22	absence of a conviction in respect of the underlying serious
23	offense which generated the proceeds alleged to have been
24	laundered."
25	Section 5. Section 913 of title 11 of the Code of the
26	Federated States of Micronesia, as amended, is hereby deleted in

1	its entirety and a new section 913 is enacted to read as follows:
2	"Section 913. Property tracking. For the purpose of
3	determining whether any property belongs to, or is in
4	the possession or under the control of, any person
5	subject to an investigation of a serious offense or a
6	money laundering offense, the Department of Justice for
7	the Federated States of Micronesia may, upon application
8	to the Supreme Court, obtain an production order
9	pursuant to section 971 of this chapter."
10	Section 6. Section 914 of title 11 of the Code of the
11	Federated States of Micronesia, as amended, is hereby deleted in
12	its entirety and a new section 914 is enacted to read as follows:
13	"Section 914. Secrecy and confidentiality obligations overridden.
14	The provisions of this chapter shall have effect notwithstanding
15	any obligation as to secrecy, confidentiality, or other restriction
16	on disclosure of information imposed by law or otherwise."
17	Section 7. Section 915 of title 11 of the Code of the Federated States
18	of Micronesia, as amended, is hereby deleted in its entirety and a new section
19	915 is enacted to read as follows:
20	"Section 915. Immunity where official powers or functions
21	exercised in good faith. No suit, prosecution or other legal
22	proceedings shall lie against the government of the Federated
23	States of Micronesia, or any officer or other person in respect of
24	anything done by or on behalf of that person, with due diligence
25	and in good faith, in the exercise of any power or the performance
26	of any function under this chapter or any regulation or order made

1	pursuant to this chapter."
2	Section 8. Sections 916, 917, 918, 919, 920, 921, 922, 923, 924, 925,
3	926, 927 and 928 of title 11 of the Code of the Federated States of Micronesia,
4	as amended, are hereby deleted in their entirety.
5	Section 9. Section 929 of title 11 of the Code of the Federated States
6	of Micronesia, as amended, is hereby further
7	amended to read as follows:
8	"Section 929. <u>Application for confiscation and pecuniary penalty</u>
9	orders.
10	(1) Where a defendant is convicted of a serious offense <u>or</u>
11	property has been seized or restrained, the Department of Justice
12	for the Federated States of Micronesia [Secretary] may apply to the
13	Supreme Court for one or both of the following orders:
14	(a) a confiscation order against property that is tainted
15	property [in respect of the offense]; or
16	(b) a pecuniary penalty order against the defendant in
17	respect of benefits derived by the defendant from the commission of
18	the offense; provided however, such application must be made within
19	\underline{three} [one] years of the date the defendant was convicted for the
20	serious offense.
21	(2) An application under subsection (1) of this section may be
22	made in respect of one or more than one offense.
23	(3) Where an application under this section is finally
24	determined, no further application for a confiscation order or a
25	pecuniary penalty order may be made [in respect of the offense for
26	which the defendant was convicted] without the leave of the Supreme

1	Court. The Supreme Court shall not give such leave unless it is
2	satisfied that:
3	(a) the property or benefit to which the new application
4	relates[τ] was acquired, accrued or [was]
5	identified after the previous application was determined;
6	(b) necessary evidence became available after the previous
7	application was determined and could not reasonably have been
8	discovered before such determination; or
9	(c) it is in the interest of justice that the new
10	application be made.
11	(4) Proceedings on an application for a confiscation or
12	pecuniary penalty order shall be civil proceedings and the standard
13	of proof shall be by the preponderance of the evidence."

12	(3) Any person who claims an interest in the property to be
13	included in the application of a confiscation order may appear and
14	adduce evidence at the hearing of the application to amend.
15	(4) Where the Secretary applies to amend an application for a
16	pecuniary penalty order against a defendant and the effect of the
17	amendment would be to include an additional benefit in the
18	application the Secretary must give the defendant no less than 14
19	days written notice of the application to amend."
20	Section 12. Section 932 of title 11 of the Code of the Federated States
21	of Micronesia, as amended, is hereby further amended to read as follows:
22	"Section 932. <u>Procedure on application.</u>
23	(1) Where an application is made to the Supreme Court for a
24	confiscation order or a pecuniary penalty order [in respect of a
25	defendant's conviction of a serious offense], the Supreme Court
26	may, in determining the application, have regard to the transcript

(2) In determining whether property is tainted property the 16 17 Supreme Court may presume, in the absence of evidence to the 18 contrary: 19 (a) that the property was used in or in connection with 20 or was intended to be used in or in connection with, the commission 21 of the offense if it was in the person's possession or effective 22 control at the time of, or immediately after the commission of the 23 offense [for which the person was convicted]; and/or 24 (b) that the property was derived, obtained or realized as 25 a result of the commission of the offense if 26 (i) the property was found during investigations

1	before or after the person was arrested for and charged with the
2	offense, in the person's possession or under the person's control
3	in a building, vehicle, receptacle or place; or
4	(ii) the property [it] was acquired by the person
5	before, during or within a reasonable time after the period of the
6	commission of the offense [of which the person was convicted], and
