Dear Speaker Figir:

I am returning the following Congressional Act that I reluctantly signed to become Public Law No. 17-67, with great reservations and with numerous item vetoes:

Congressional Act No. 17-66, "AN ACT TO APPROPRIATE THE SUM OF \$5,697,383 FROM THE GENERAL FUND OF THE FEDERATED STATES OF MICRONESIA FOR THE FISCAL YEAR ENDING SEPTEMBER 30, 2013, FOR THE PURPOSE OF PAYING THE AMOUNT OWED BY THE STATE GOVERNMENTS TO FEMA AND TO FUND PUBLIC PROJECTS AND SOCIAL PROGRAMS IN THE STATES OF YAP, KOSRAE, POHNPEI AND CHUUK, AND FOR OTHER PURPOSES."

First of all, I wish to thank Congress for taking action on the FEMA reimbursement – a course of action that the Executive Branch recommended in order to avoid jeopardizing ongoing and future US Federal Programs in the FSM. However, I have several concerns regarding the language of reimbursement to FEMA in this Act, as set forth below:

- 1. Sections 2, 3, 4, and 5, as set out in the Act require the national government to reimburse FEMA on behalf of the states. However, Section 2(1) relating to Yap, and Section 5(1) relating to Chuuk, establish a different repayment arrangement back to the FSM national government that creates ambiguity and confusion. As for the State of Kosrae and the State of Pohnpei, there is no repayment to the FSM national government provided in the Act.
- 2. The language of Subsection 2(1) is vague and confusing. It provides that the amount owed by the State of Yap to FEMA is deemed an "advance" and that repayment shall be directed to three special projects. The result is confusing as to what is meant by deeming the amount owed as an "advance" and whether the State of Yap is actually making repayment to the FSM national government. Is the State of Yap expecting the FSM national government to make reimbursement to FEMA and in lieu of the State of Yap repaying the national government, the State of Yap will instead apply its repayment to the three enumerated special projects? Due to the vagueness and confusion of the above, I must line veto Subsection 2(1).

- 3. The language of Subsection 5(1), requires the State of Chuuk to repay the FSM national government in such a manner as will be agreed to between the allottee (the President) and the Chuuk State leadership. This language, too, is vague and leaves the FSM national government open to protracted discussions in order to get reimbursed. Establishment of a timeline for repayment would clarify any ambiguity.
- 4. The Act does not require any repayment to the FSM national government from State of Kosrae and State of Pohnpei, leaving the FSM national government burdened with \$234,313 and no plans for repayment.
- 5. In the absence of any justification for a different treatment across the four States, equal protection of laws becomes a potential legal issue.
- 6. Additionally, each member of Congress is allocated \$300,000 worth of public projects as follows:
  - Yap = \$600,000 divided by 2 members = \$300,000 each (Section 2);
  - Kosrae = \$600,00 divided by 2 members = \$300,000 each (Section 3);
  - Pohnpei = \$1,200,000 divided by 4 members = \$300,000 each (Section 4); and,
  - Chuuk = \$1,800,000 divided by 6 members = \$300,000 each (Section 5).

However, because the repayment of FEMA debt to the FSM national government by the State of Yap is directed back to State of Yap projects totaling \$284,210, in effect, the allocation of public projects for each member of the Yap Delegation is increased to \$442,105. As there is no explanation for this disparity, I felt obliged to point it out.

Mixing FEMA reimbursement with public project allocations creates confusion. The FEMA reimbursement – being an extension of the terms and conditions of US federal grants – constitutes a different subject matter than local projects, which is why I submitted a request on FEMA separately from any other supplemental budget. I recommend that the FEMA reimbursement be made separate from public projects; and, I urge Congress to consider this approach during the remainder of its special session.

- 8. Finally, from a practical standpoint, it is difficult to effect smooth reimbursement to FEMA with the designation of multiple allottees in the Act. Therefore, I recommend that the national government pool all FEMA reimbursement funds from the allottees as soon as possible in order for the President to reimburse FEMA in a lump sum. A lump sum payment will avoid duplication of work and ensure consistency in dealing with all possible issues surrounding the reimbursement.
- 9. The total amount being appropriated to reimburse FEMA, i.e., \$1,497,383, is larger than the total amount FEMA is requesting for reimbursement, i.e., \$1,352,000.

#### **Public Projects**

As for public projects, I do not oppose those that are linked to the Nation's Strategic Development Plan. But I consistently oppose public expenditures that have little or no lasting impact on the economy. We also must consider the looming financial challenges tied with the expiration of the Amended Compact (just 10 years away). We, as a Nation, must plan for this eventuality. The national agencies implementing public projects, and the States benefiting from them, must formulate projects together. For the sake of transparency and the involvement of the public whom we serve, public hearings and open consultations are important. Unfortunately, no public hearings or consultations were ever held before approving this Act. On the contrary, the observations above indicate haste. Once again, I urge Congress to develop clear standards for public projects and social programs, tied to the Nation's Strategic Development Plan, with public hearings required to promote transparency.

In view of the above, I veto the following items:

I reiterate the recommendation for Congress to expeditiously consider them.

#### Supplemental Budget

On the supplemental budget, I wish to clarify my letter of November 12, 2012, regarding the FY2012 carryover. Based on updated information, the so-called "carry-over" of \$5,902,120 includes *revenue surplus* from fishing fees. The revenue surplus can easily be confirmed before an audit.

### PUBLIC LAW No. 17-67

#### AN ACT

To appropriate the sum of \$5,697,383 from the General Fund of the Federated States of Micronesia for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2013, for the purpose of paying the amount owed by the State Governments to FEMA and to fund public projects and social programs in the States of Yap, Kosrae, Pohnpei and Chuuk, and for other purposes.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS OF THE FEDERATED STATES OF MICRONESIA:

- 1 Section 1. The sum of \$5,697,383, or so much thereof as may
- 2 be necessary, is hereby appropriated from the General Fund of the
- 3 Federated States of Micronesia for the fiscal year ending
